



Video abstracts

Many organizations employ multimedia content to engage with their audiences. Short videos presented by the originator of an article can provide an accessible platform for presenting a summary of an article, and also assist in signposting users to research particularly relevant to their needs. In essence, video abstracts can be seen as another way to help drive readers to your article.

You will find below some general guidelines which we have provided for video abstract production.

Editorial guidelines for authors

- Please work to the following guidelines when producing your video abstract:
- Videos should be around 3 minutes in duration, maximum of 5 minutes.
- Film the video in a well-lit and professional environment when possible.
- Authors should aim to introduce the subject of the paper, highlight the main findings, and if relevant discuss future potential developments in the field as a result of the work.
- Please aim to make the video understandable and accessible to users outside of the immediate field of the research.
- Inclusion of additional relevant/supplementary material such as images, animations and figures is encouraged.
- Please do not include small text/objects that will prove difficult to read.

Technical guidelines

Video abstracts must meet minimum standards of quality for both video and audio. In creating a video abstract, please try and work to the following basic specifications:

- Format: .mov, .mpg, .mp4, .avi, .wmv
- Maximum file size: 500mb
- Video file name which includes the journal title and the title of your work

Please note:

All video abstracts will be assessed for editorial suitability and general quality by the editorial team. We reserve the right not to publish a video abstract if it does not meet our basic criteria. Videos will not be peer reviewed or edited by Policy Press staff, so authors must ensure that all statements are valid and accurate.
